# Learning a new skill

What to do in enforced isolation? Learn something that needs time, perseverance and patience perhaps. I have been interested in making Sourdough bread for a long time because of the many Biblical references to leaven and yeast. Yeast is sometimes referred to as evil, and at other times as good. Passover is followed by seven days of the Feast of unleavened bread. In fact before the mid 1800s all bread was made with natural yeast trapped in the organic bread flour.

My first attempt was an absolute disaster and not even the birds could get their beaks into it, but thanks to the wretched virus I have had time to try again. Second and third attempts were very much better although



the crust is still too hard. I make my own starter, using water (tap water which has been sitting in a bottle for 24 hours) and organic bread flour in which there is natural yeast and after five days of feeding (there are good methods on various websites) I put it in the fridge and forget about it until needed.

The secret with Sourdough is to be patient, (a loaf takes over two days to make from start to finish), be gentle with the kneading, and persevere. It is fun, the result is so much healthier than shop bread, and very therapeutic. *Tim.*
